

FOUR SIMPLE STEPS

1. CONTACT YOUR SOLICITOR

via the number or email address below to make an appointment for November. Please do this in good time as solicitors are often very busy during this month.

2. WRITE DOWN A LIST OF YOUR ASSETS

(your house, possessions and money) and details of the people you would like to inherit them. Once you have provided for your loved ones you could also consider making a gift to charity. Many people find great comfort in knowing that a cause close to their heart will benefit once they have passed away.

3. MEET YOUR SOLICITOR

to give him or her your instructions. If your instructions are complicated, or you need additional advice about inheritance tax planning, your solicitor will advise whether any extra work and related fees are needed at this stage.

4. YOUR SOLICITOR WILL DRAFT YOUR WILL

and if you haven't already made your donation online at our website, you can give it to your solicitor who will pass it on to us.

In Zanzibar, Dr Issa Burham offers clinics to local people who are needlessly blind. Every day he travels to village halls, clinics and people's homes to deliver sight-saving treatment. His work is supported by Sightsavers, who train eye surgeons to deliver screening and treatment to communities in the developing world.
